4. A RECENT EVENT - Saltaire September 13th
 Several members of the Dales Music and Dance Collective made an appearance as part of the Saltaire Festival **Grand Yorkshire Crack** event at the Caroline

Street Club in Saltaire in September. Mark & Georgina played and sang in vigorous Appalachian style and joined Richard in a 10 minute musical journey of six Dales tunes from Buckden to Leeds via Dentdale, Grassington and Baldersdale. Devotees of Bob's book will be able to guess which tunes. Anahata (Melodeon) & Mary (English concertina) from their Barley Cote Band gave a dazzlingly virtuoso performance of Bill Hall's Quicksteps 1 and 2. Colin presented an audio-visual version of his **Lost Chronicles of York** (several poems from which were first heard at The Buck Inn sessions) aided most ably by Georgina. There was also poetry from Wharfedale poet Robert Gibson, story-telling in Yorkshire dialect, and a confident reading from her phone by Zara Seber who had graduated just this year from the course on English Literature and Creative Writing at Leeds Met University. The afternoon had been opened by Talk Tyke, a presentation and discussion by Rod Dimpleby of the Yorkshire Dialect Society about the nature and power of Yorkshire Dialect, while the evening was rounded off with excellent pie and peas, and local ale, then traditional Dixieland jazz from local group Yardfest Jazz.

4. A NEW PARTNER FOR US. WIDENING OUR FOCUS, EXTENDING OUR REACH

Dales Music and Dance Collective has signed up to becoming a Yorkshire Society Heritage Guardian

In recognition of the fact that the **Dales Music and Dance Collective** has a key role in preserving, re-discovering and sharing what is now a living heritage of traditional (and new) Dales tunes, songs and dances – and increasingly dialect and poetry – we have been invited to join the elite group of around 50 organisations in Yorkshire recognised by the Yorkshire Society as a **Yorkshire Heritage Guardian**.

This means our website and contact details now form part of a network of organisations within the Yorkshire Society with whom we can share information and news, including details of coming events. We will also be invited to take part in the prestigious **Heritage Guardians Summit** which in 2024 will take place in Hull, in the magnificent Minster in the centre of the historic Old Town where we expect to have up to 50 stall holders from many organisations concerned with Yorkshire's Heritage and environment, attracting visitors from all over the region. This will take place on **Saturday May 11th** and also include an evening of folk music by one of Hull's amazing maritime music groups. There will also be guided walks and tours around the Hull waterfront and into the Yorkshire Wolds

on the following day. As well as the Hull Heritage Gardens Summit in May there are also plans to be drawn up about some major regional events to take place in York in August next year to coincide with Yorkshire Day, which in 2024 will be in York.

Meet Yorkshire Garland – our new key partner.

One immediate benefit of being part of the Yorkshire Society's Heritage Guardians network has been for us to be in touch with the leading group of folk musicians, singers and dancers in our Region, **Yorkshire Garland**, itself a linking up of various Yorkshire folk groups and individual musicians.

Though mainly based in East Yorkshire and York (which is why our work in the Dales and West Yorkshire is of interest to them) Yorkshire Garland is a group which has done much to champion music in our region over the last two decades.

What is very special is that their website [The Yorkshire Garland Group](http://TheYorkshireGarlandGroup.yorkshirefolksong.net) and yorkshirefolksong.net contains a rich and unique collection of over 120 traditional Yorkshire songs, some of them sung by singers going back decades. All the recordings, music and words, are there, free of charge, to download and listen to, and perhaps inspire new work. It is a huge and impressive resource.

We hope our partnership and link-up with Yorkshire Garland will develop and flourish and help support both Yorkshire Garland and our own Dales Collective to bring Dales music and dance to wider audiences, especially of younger people.

5. A DALESMAN'S LITANY

Here's a Yorkshire Dialect song which can be seen and heard on the Yorkshire Garland website. It was written in about 1900 by Fred Moorman who was Professor of English Language at Leeds University. It must be familiar to some of our singers at the Buck sessions. Muppet? Let's hear it!

*It's hard when folks can't find their work where they've been bred and born;
When I was young I always thout I'd bide amang rooits and corn. (rooits = roots)*

*But I've been forced to work in towns so here's my litany,
From Hull and Halifax and Hell, good Lord deliver me.*

*When I was courtin' Mary Jane t' old squire he says one day,
"I've got no room for wedded folk so wilt ta wed or stay?"
Well I couldn't leave the lass I loved so to town we had to flee,
From Hull and Halifax and Hell, good Lord deliver me.*

*I've worked in Leeds and Huddersfield, I've addled honest brass,
At Bradford, Keighley, Rotherham, I've kept me bairns and lass;
I've travelled all three ridin's round and once I went to sea.
From forges, mills and coalin' boats, good Lord deliver me.*

*I've walked at neet down Sheffield lanes, 't was the same as bein' in Hell;
Furnaces thrust out tongues of fire that roared like wind on t' fell;
I've sammed up coil in Barnsley pits wi' muck upto me knees. (sammed up = picked up)
From Sheffield, Barnsley, Rotherham, good Lord deliver me.*

*I've seen grey fog creep ovver Leeds Brig as thick as Bastille soup;
I've lived where folks have been stowed away like rabbits in a coop;
I've seen snow float down Bradford Beck as black as ebony.
From Hunslet, Holbeck, Wibsey Slack, good Lord deliver me.*

*Well now when all our children have flown, to the country we've come back;
There's forty miles of heathery moor 'twixt us and coilpit stack;
And often as I sit by the fire at neet I laugh and I shout with glee,
From Hull and Halifax and Hell, good Lord deliver me.*
